Year after year, violent attacks have swept through Christian communities in Northern Nigeria. In 2025 alone, anti-Christian violence resulted in multiple deaths, abductions and physical injuries, along with deep emotional wounds for survivors mourning the heartbreaking loss of loved ones and the destruction of their homes. As this year comes to a close, there is little hope that such horrific incidents of persecution will cease. And yet, where faith takes root, hope flourishes.

Christmas is a season of renewed hope for all who submit to the Lordship of Jesus Christ. The Son of God, who willingly took on human form, embraced the full experience of humanity in order to fulfill His divine mission as the Saviour of the world. This profound act of love bridged the gap between God and humankind, offering the promise of redemption and eternal life to all who believe in Him. It is with this assurance that our Nigerian brothers and sisters in Christ can confidently sing, "Sorrow and sadness in the new year will not be our portion, Good God."

Hope not only uplifts and inspires others but also draws them in with wonder, much like the humble birth of Christ whose cradle was a simple manger. In Nigeria, even as persecution rages against the church, the Holy Spirit is moving powerfully in the hearts of those who are hearing the Gospel message. This truth is highlighted by one of our ministry partners, who shared the following update:

"Recently, three missionaries who were kidnapped – and later released – have persisted in their mission to gather and teach new converts Christianity. However, many areas still lack dedicated missionaries or pastors needed to teach and nurture the growing groups of believers. Praise God that, in the past year, 14 new mission stations have been established, providing places for worship. We've also helped build pastors' houses and improved access to water. Please keep these missionaries in your prayers."

During Jesus' birth, Judea was under Roman rule. The Jews longed for a Messiah to restore King David's throne and free them from oppression. This historical reality contrasts sharply with the serene Christmas imagery we often see today. Unlike many Jews of that time who expected a political liberator, persecuted Nigerian Christians understand the Messiah's true nature. They recognize that Jesus came not to establish an earthly kingdom but to inaugurate a divine Kingdom – one built on love, justice and redemption. It is this truth that ultimately sustains their hope amid trials.

As you read this issue of *One Voice*, I pray that you will celebrate alongside our Nigerian brothers and sisters the hope we have in Christ, the "King of kings." Let this season be a reminder that our future is not defined by suffering, but secured in the promise of a glorious heavenly home. Though sorrow may last through the night, joy comes in the morning with angelic choirs singing, "Glory to God in the highest, and on earth peace among those with whom He is pleased!"²

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Faithful Through the Fire

Nigeria's Resilient Christian Widows

n recent years, militant Islamist violence has left hundreds of Christian women in Northern Nigeria widowed and vulnerable. While grappling with grief and uncertainty, many of these women – having little formal education or employable skills – struggle to provide for their families. Cultural expectations dictate that a deceased husband's family should care for his widow, but Christian women (especially those who have left Islam to follow Christ) are often rejected and left to fend for themselves. In their desperate state, some widows become vulnerable to sexual exploitation, which causes further distress as well as lasting shame.

The resilient Christian women you will meet in the following pages have endured unimaginable losses and hardships, yet they continue to steadfastly cling to Christ. Since discovering that they are not alone nor forgotten, each of their stories have become a tremendous source of hope – not only for themselves but for other widows in Nigeria who are walking along a similar path. By reading these testimonies and sharing them with others, *you* become part of the redemptive work that God is doing in and through their lives. Not only is their suffering now being used for a far greater purpose, but it is also shining the light of Jesus into the darkness of a world desperately in need of His salvation.

Regina's husband, Danbaki, was a Nigerian missionary who moved his family to a remote area in the northwestern part of the country where villagers hadn't heard the Gospel message before. On June 14th, 2022, Islamic militants attacked their village and murdered a dozen people. Regina and her family were captured while trying to escape the horrific atrocities. When the militants questioned Danbaki, he told them that he was a missionary – even though the mention of this could put his life at risk. As he pleaded for mercy, the Islamists shot him to death in front of Regina. Then they physically assaulted the traumatized widow and her two-year-old son, Joshua, whom she was carrying on her back. Although this mother and her young child survived, Regina has been grieving the loss of her husband ever since. "Anytime I remember, it is so painful," she acknowledges. "Even when you forgive, it is not easy to forget. God is still working on my heart." Today, with the assistance of VOM's international ministry workers, Regina is raising three children, the oldest of whom is ten.





Lydia was selling tomatoes along the roadside when militant Fulani Muslims suddenly raided her village. At the sound of gunshots, she quickly fled into the bush. But when the Christian woman returned to her village the next day, she found her husband's mutilated, lifeless body amid the rubble of their burned home. "I could not stop crying," Lydia recalls of that fateful day. This widowed mother has five children, ranging in age from three to fifteen.

Chundung's husband, David, was killed on September 7th, 2001, in Jos, Nigeria. While walking to the bank that day, he got caught up in a battle between the community's Muslims and Christians. Twenty other people from their church were also slain that day. As David's body had never been found, the family couldn't conduct a burial for him. Chundung, who was left to raise their four children on her own, admits: "Life has not been easy for me. I could not hold myself up, and I could not feed my children." Through the support of a partnering Christian ministry, this widowed mother and her children were able to receive greatly needed assistance.





Rebeccah's husband was shot to death by Boko Haram militants in 2014 while he was walking to church one day. At the time, Rebeccah was pregnant with their fifth child. After the militants destroyed the family's village in the attack, Rebecca didn't know what happened to her missing husband. It wasn't until three days later that she discovered his body in a morgue. Shortly after her husband's murder, Rebeccah's faith wavered and she struggled to provide basic necessities for her growing children. Yet, after receiving months of Biblically based trauma counselling, as well as opportunities to process her pain with other surviving Christians, Rebeccah's faith has thankfully been restored.




Asabe was raised in a Muslim household. Yet, after encountering the truth of the Gospel, she made the courageous decision to follow Christ. Eventually, she married a Christian man named Yakuba who shared her love for Jesus. In 2020, members of Boko Haram bombed their village, and Yakuba was tragically killed. In the aftermath of the attack, Asabe's grief over the loss of her husband was compounded when Yakuba's Muslim brother threw Asabe and her child out of their home. Despite all the heartache she has been through, this dear Christian woman says, "I learned [to extend] forgiveness towards everyone who has hurt me."

Boko Haram attacked Ruth's village in 2013, killing several hundred people and burning many homes and buildings – including her church. She explained to our ministry workers that the militants were angry because Muslims in her village of Gowza had been turning to faith in Christ. Although Ruth's family – consisting of six children from the ages of two to sixteen – survived the attack, they had to walk for 17 days to reach safety in Cameroon. Unfortunately, her husband, Luka, was never the same after the ordeal. Ruth believes the lingering effects of the attack ultimately led to his death in 2021. After learning



Biblical approaches to healing and forgiveness, she was able to let go of her own pain. "I never thought I would ever forgive [the Boko Haram terrorists], but I did," she proclaims. "I have not only forgiven them, but I love them."



Gwom's husband, a pastor, was killed on May 3rd, 2015, after he and several other men travelled to a neighbouring village to help victims of a previously occurring attack by militant Fulani Muslims. The men travelling with Gwom's husband, as well as 17 of the villagers they went to assist, had also been murdered, presumably by the same militants. Even though Gwom doesn't know how her husband died or where he is buried, she longs for others to have a personal relationship with the Lord who has miraculously restored her soul. "I want people to know that [He] is a merciful God," she concludes.

HOW YOU CAN HELP

VOMC's Healing Justice for Widows project seeks to bring hope and restoration to the lives of Nigerian Christian widows and their children by providing emergency food aid, housing assistance, urgent medical care, tuition support and legal aid. In addition to these practical relief efforts, this project also offers vocational skills training to help widows establish sustainable small businesses. Most importantly, the women are able to receive Christian counselling, as well as the emotional support of those who have successfully recovered from similar experiences. As a result, these sisters in Christ are finding renewed hope, the grace to forgive, and strength to triumphantly rebuild their lives.

Eternal Lessons Learned in Nigeria

or over 25 years, I have travelled to dozens of countries where our Christian brothers and sisters face severe persecution for their faith in Jesus. Each encounter has revealed a believer's deeply personal story of pain and resilience, as well as their journey towards healing and forgiveness.

While visiting Northern Nigeria, I met Christian families that have been torn apart by radical Islamists who are determined to demoralize and weaken the church. Yet, despite the relentless brutality perpetrated against followers of Christ within the region, I have witnessed something extraordinary: a steadfast faith that refuses to be broken. With this in mind, I would like to share with you the powerful stories of two persecuted Nigerian believers who understand that there is something more precious than life itself – and that is to remain faithful to the God whom they so dearly love and worship.

Trusting in the Promises of Eternity

On Christmas Eve of 2023, in the Christian village of Mbong (Plateau State), a mix of excitement and tension filled the air. The excitement came from the anticipation of celebrating the birth of Jesus; whereas the tension stemmed from the very real threat of a potential attack by radical Fulani Muslim herdsmen – a danger that loomed heavily over the Christian community.

Pastor Gideon Dawel, the leader of the Christ Apostolic Church, joined the village men in keeping watch for a possible attack. "I went outside at least a kilometre from my house," Pastor Gideon recalls. "It was getting darker, [and I didn't know] that the Fulani people [were] coming for the attack. They came silently. When they arrived, they chanted 'Allahu Akbar.' They began shooting rapidly, so I couldn't go back home."

When the ambush began, Pastor Gideon's wife Hannah, along with their five daughters, decided to remain inside the house, locking the doors and hoping that the terrorists wouldn't be able to break in. This decision proved to be devastating. On Christmas morning, Pastor Gideon rushed back home in search of his family and made a horrific discovery. The militants had set his house ablaze, causing Hannah (who was pregnant) – along with all five of their daughters – to perish in the fire. "I entered [the ruins of the house] and discovered them in one place," Pastor Gideon

explains. "I thought they were praying until they died there because they were in one place."

Even in the aftermath of unimaginable loss, Pastor Gideon clings to his hope in Jesus. Having an eternal perspective helps him to cope with his grief: "As the Scriptures imply, someday I will see [my family]. Someday I will see them in the presence of God. Humanly, it's painful. However, in the spiritual realm, it's awesome. I believe I will see them...someday."

Today, VOMC's ministry workers are walking alongside this grieving pastor as he recovers from the tragedy and rebuilds his life. They are also helping him to construct a new home in the city of Jos. (As you can understand, he chose not to return to his village where he lost so much.) Recently, Pastor Gideon joined me and my VOMC colleague, Stephen

Wesley, at a pastors' conference in Southern Nigeria. We felt that it was vital for Christian leaders in the south to hear his story, so they could stand in solidarity with their suffering brothers and sisters in the north.

As Pastor Gideon spoke, everyone in the room was moved by his testimony. Following the message, we gathered around him in prayer. It was a deeply powerful and emotional moment. By the end of the conference, the pastors made a heartfelt commitment to support the persecuted church in the north.

Pastor Gideon may carry the pain of losing his family for the rest of his life. Yet, I've learned from one of our conversations that, just months after the tragedy, he had not only forgiven those who took the lives of his beloved wife and daughters; he also began to pray that the assailants would come to faith in Jesus. In addition to sharing his story of forgiveness and grace when speaking in churches across Canada, Pakistan and Nigeria, I have featured it in various media platforms. His remarkable testimony continues to stir hearts, prompting many – including myself – to ask the question, "Are there people whom I need to forgive?"





Hope Beyond Heartbreak

Amina Adams Ghumdia is another follower of Jesus in Nigeria who stands as a radiant witness for Christ by demonstrating the power of faith in the midst of suffering. On October 2nd, 2012, this believer's life changed forever when Boko Haram terrorists stormed her home in Maiduguri, Borno State.

"They tied up my husband and three of my children," Amina recalls, "and they asked for money." The intruders took everything of material value – cash, household items, and even the family's vehicles – but their cruelty didn't end there. "They started asking my children and my husband to renounce Christ," she adds. When their demands were refused, the militants forced Amina's loved ones to lie down flat on the ground. As she watched in horror, the armed men executed her husband and seriously wounded her two sons before fleeing the area.

While many would respond to such horror with anger and despair, Amina's response was marked by a compassion that echoed the heart of Christ. "I was not angry with God because I knew something like that could happen," she says. "As a Christian, one has to be prepared for this at

any time.... Those who killed my husband...were ignorant [about what they were doing]. That is why they did it."

After being rushed to the hospital, both of Amina's boys miraculously survived their injuries. Following their recoveries, Amina and her surviving family fled the area. However, five years later, while travelling to a funeral in a marked police van, Amina and her travelling companions were ambushed by Boko Haram militants. When the perpetrators discovered that the passengers were Christians, they killed all five men on board and kidnapped the 11 women – including Amina.

Taken deep into the forest, Amina and her friends endured months of captivity. "We stayed there for eight months in hardship, trauma and fear, but God gave us the grace to stand [strong] in our faith," she attests. Amina was comforted

during this time by remembering that, despite the horrible circumstances, the Lord was with her and the other women throughout their ordeal. She also regularly found strength by recalling the Apostle Paul's words in Philippians 1:21: "For me, to live is Christ and to die is gain" (CSB).

Although one of the kidnapped victims tragically died from her injuries, Amina and the nine other surviving women were eventually released. Now, years later, this widow has also come to terms with the death of her husband, and willingly forgives those who committed the crimes. "It was not easy," she admits, "but the Bible told me that I have to forgive, so I can be forgiven (Matthew 6:14)."


In collaboration with trusted ministry partners, VOMC has since provided this faithful sister in Christ a new home. Amina is grateful for the help she's received from her Christian brothers and sisters in Canada. "I appreciate the effort, and pray that God will continue to sustain me," she says. "I thank them so much. I give glory to God because of them."

The stories of Pastor Gideon and Amina are sobering reminders of the enormous cost many followers of Jesus pay in places where being a Christian can mean losing everything. Yet, they are also radiant testimonies of God's divine grace – the supernatural ability to forgive the unforgiveable, experience hope beyond heartbreak, and trust in His reassuring promises of eternity.

As we reflect on these believers' journeys to forgiveness, may we be personally challenged to keep our eyes fixed on Jesus, remaining mindful that this world is not our eternal home and that we are all called to extend mercy where it's most needed.

Thank you for standing in solidarity with our persecuted brothers and sisters around the world. Their testimonies of faith are not only inspiring – they serve as a call to action. By partnering with the work of our Lord through your compassionate prayers and support, believers like Pastor Gideon and Amina are being assured of His loving care for them.

OPERATION CHRISTMAS BLESSING

Our desire to do something special during the Christmas season for the needy families of persecuted Christians initiated what was called in those early days of the ministry, *Operation Christmas Blessing* (OCB). Children of families suffering for their faith often go through traumatic experiences. For them to receive a Christian colouring book or a little toy means so much. Considering this, we began to ask supporters of the VOMC ministry to fill individual boxes with Christmas gifts for the children.

This hands-on project greatly appealed to our supporters. However, the initial concept also had its drawbacks. There were instances when the contents contained within one gift box were notably greater in value than that of another.

Secondly, the regulations for shipping and customs proved to be very difficult and expensive. This annual endeavour, now referred to as VOMC's *Christmas Blessing* project, is processed quite differently today. VOMC sends the donated funds to trustworthy ministry partners located within each of the selected countries. This method of distribution allows for gift items to be bought locally within each country, thereby benefitting its local merchants. In addition to practical items and toys for the children, we also ensure that a children's Bible or other helpful Christian resources are included.

Over the many years that have transpired since the initial outreach in El Salvador during 1993, VOMC has continued its *Christmas Blessing* distributions in different countries year after year. Through the generous donations of our supporters, the ministry has blessed thousands of needy children and their families.



During this season of giving, we hope to once again bless the lives of many families who are not only struggling to make ends meet financially, but also facing challenges of persecution for following Christ.

This year's Christmas Blessing distributions will reach Christian children in India who are growing up within areas where persecution is intensifying and anti-conversion laws are increasingly being enforced. Amid the rising tide of Hindutva ideology, which is aggressively promoted by Hindu nationalists, these children are often targeted and pressured to abandon their faith. Many of them live in fear and uncertainty, quietly carrying the emotional burden of their families' suffering and the hostility that surrounds them.


